Welcome to the 2023-2024 school year. The beginning of each school year is filled with excitement and anticipation of all the great things to come and this year is no different. Edwardsburg is known statewide for providing an exceptional educational experience to all students. The creed, "Once an Eddie, Always an Eddie," really embodies what it means to be a part of the Edwardsburg school community. We truly care about our students, our families, our staff and our community, all of whom make our district what it is today.

Edwardsburg is a special place that honors past traditions while celebrating all that the future has to offer our students. Edwardsburg continues to seek out and provide a wide array of programs, experiences and opportunities for our students, both in and out of the classroom. At the elementary level, families have the option of choosing Traditional, Gender Specific, Multi-Age and Looping classrooms for their children. At the Intermediate School, fifth grade students are able to take advantage of our Beginning Band program. In all of our elementary buildings, students are provided with age appropriate enrichment experiences in many areas, including fine arts and athletics. Through the Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) offered by the Heritage Southwest ISD, some of our littlest Eddies are able to take advantage of a preschool program that is conveniently located within our district.

At the secondary level, students have the opportunity to take a variety of classes and Advanced Placement courses in core areas as well as fine arts, manufacturing and engineering. Through dual-enrollment at Southwestern Michigan College (SMC), Indiana University of South Bend (IUSB), Glen Oaks Community College, and Berrien Math and Science Center at Andrews University, students are able to earn college and high school credit simultaneously. Students can also take advantage of our Middle College option where they have the potential to earn an Associate's degree while they are completing the requirements for their high school diploma. In addition to accessing opportunities at the college level, students have the opportunity to attend the Elkhart Area Career Center to pursue a hands-on, work-based learning experience. Outside of the classroom, our students have the ability to compete in middle school and high school athletics as well as the option to participate in a number of activities and clubs including robotics. To ensure that EPS is reaching all learners, Edwardsburg also has the successful Alternative Learning Center for our Eddies who need something a little different than the traditional high school experience.

We take pride in the fact that all of our buildings have received Blue Ribbon recognition by the Michigan Department of Education. At all levels, Edwardsburg Public Schools is committed to providing our students the opportunities and experiences both during and after the school day to find their passion and success in the world. The future is bright, knowing that our Eddies will be prepared to pursue their dreams when they leave EPS.



Equal Educational Opportunity

If any person believes that the Edwardsburg Public School District or any of the district's staff has inadequately applied the principles and/or regulations of Title II, Title VI, and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Tile IX of the Education Amendment Act of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, The Age Act and The Americans with Disabilities Act, s/he may bring forward a complaint to the district's Civil Rights Coordinator at Edwardsburg Public Schools, 69410 Section Street, Edwardsburg, Michigan 49112, (269-663-1048).

Compliance Officer

Any person who believes that s/he has been discriminated against on the basis of the aforementioned at school or a school activity should contact the School District's Compliance Officer at 69410 Section Street, Edwardsburg, MI 49112, (269-663-1048).

Grievance Procedures

If any person believes that the Edwardsburg Public Schools or any of the District's staff has inadequately applied the principles and/or regulations of (1) Title II, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, (2) Title IX of the Education Amendment Act of 1972, (3) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, (4) The Age Act, and (5) The Americans with Disabilities Act, s/he may bring forward a complaint, which shall be referred to as a grievance, to the District's Civil Rights Coordinator. The person who believes s/he has a valid basis for grievance shall discuss the grievance informally and on a verbal basis with the local Civil Rights Coordinator, who shall in turn investigate the complaint and reply with an answer to the complainant. S/He may initiate formal procedures according to the following steps:

Step 1

A written statement of the grievance signed by the complainant shall be submitted to the local Civil Rights Coordinator within five business days of receipt of answer to the informal complaint. The coordinator shall further investigate the matters of grievance and a decision regarding the allegations will be made in writing to the complainant.

Step 2

If the complainant wishes to appeal the decision of the local Civil Rights Coordinator, s/he may submit a signed statement or appeal to the Superintendent of Schools within five business days after receipt of the Coordinator's response. The Superintendent shall meet with all parties involved, formulate a conclusion, and respond in writing to the complainant.

Step 3

If the complainant remains unsatisfied, s/he may appeal through a signed written statement to the Board of Education within five business days of his/her receipt of the Superintendent's response in step two. In an attempt to resolve the grievance, the Board of Education shall meet with the concerned parties and their representative within forty days of the receipt of such an appeal. A copy of the Board's disposition of the appeal shall be sent to each concerned party within ten business days of this meeting.

Step 4

If at this point the grievance has not been satisfactorily settled, further appeal may be made to the U.S.

Use of Pesticides

Pesticides are periodically applied to school property. Pesticides are usually applied during non-school hours. Parents/Guardians may request an Advisory Form from Christine Neff by calling 269-663-1043. The Advisory Form will provide prior information on any application of an insecticide, fungicide, or herbicide made to the school grounds or buildings during this school year. In certain emergencies, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students. Advisory Form participants will be notified following any such application.

(Material Safety Data Sheets) Under Section 313 Community Right-to-Know Act, Material Safety Data Sheets are available for your viewing in all school offices.

Student Records

In order to provide appropriate educational services and programming, the Board of Education must collect, retain, and use information about individual students. Simultaneously, the Board recognizes the need to safeguard student's privacy and restrict access to student's personally identifiable information. The Board is responsible for maintaining records of all students attending schools in this District. Only records mandated by the State or Federal government and/or necessary and relevant to the function of the School District or specifically permitted by this Board will be compiled by Board employees. The Board hereby authorizes collection of the following student records, in addition to the membership record required by law: observations and ratings of individual students by professional staff members acting within their sphere of competency; samples of student work; information obtained from professionally acceptable standard instruments of measurement such as: inventories and aptitude tests, vocational preference inventories, achievement tests, standardized intelligence tests; and authenticated information provided by a parent or eligible student concerning achievements and other school activities which the parent or student wants to make a part of the record; verified reports of serious or recurrent behavior patterns; rank in class and academic honors earned; psychological tests; attendance records; health records, and custodial arrangements.

Student records shall be available only to students and their parents, eligible students, and designated school officials, who have a legitimate educational interest in the information, or to other individuals or organizations as permitted by law. In situations in which a student has both a custodial and a non-custodial parent, both shall have access to the student's educational records unless stipulated otherwise by court order. In the case of eligible students, parents will be allowed access to the records without the student's consent, provided the student is considered a dependent under section 152 of the Internal Revenue Code. The Board authorizes the administration to: forward student records, including any suspension and expulsion action against the student, on request to a school or school district in which a student of this District seeks or intends to enroll upon condition that the student's parents be notified of the transfer, receive a copy of the record if desired, and have an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of the record; forward student records, including disciplinary records with respect to suspensions and expulsions, upon request to a public school or school district in which a student in foster care is enrolled. Such records shall be transferred within one (1) school day of the enrolling school's request; provide "personally-identifiable" information to appropriate parties, including parents of an eligible student, whose knowledge of the information is necessary to protect the health and safety of the student or other individuals if there is an articulable and significant threat to the health or safety of a student or other individuals, considering the totality of the circumstances; report a crime committed by a child with or without a disability to appropriate authorities and, with respect to reporting a crime committed by a student with a disability, to transmit copies of the student's special education records and disciplinary records including any suspension and expulsion action against the student to the authorities and school officials for their consideration; and request each person or party requesting access to a student's record to abide by the Federal regulations concerning the disclosure of information. The Board will comply with a legitimate request for access to a student's records within a reasonable period of time but not more than forty-five days after receiving the request or within a shorter period as may be applicable to students with disabilities. Upon the request of the viewer, a record shall be reproduced, unless said record is copyrighted, and the viewer may be charged a fee equivalent to the cost of handling and reproduction.

Department of Education, Office of Civil Rights, Plaza Nine Building, Room 300, 55 Erieview Plaza, Cleveland, Ohio 44114. Inquiries concerning the non-discriminatory policy may be directed to Director, Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20201. The local Coordinator, on request, will provide a copy of the District's grievance procedure and investigate all complaints in accordance with this procedure. A copy of each of the Acts and the regulations, on which this notice is based, may be found in the Civil Rights Coordinator's office.

Drug-Free Schools

In accordance with Federal Law, the Board of Education prohibits the use, possession, concealment, or distribution of drugs by students on school grounds, in school or school- approved vehicles, or at any school-related event. Drugs include any alcoholic beverage, anabolic steroid, dangerous controlled substance as defined by State statute or substance that could be considered a "look-a-like" controlled substance. Compliance with this policy is mandatory for all students. Any student who violates this policy will be subject to disciplinary action, in accordance with due process and as specified in the student handbooks, up to and by which s/he receives help through programs and services available in the community. Students and their parents should contact the principal, counselor, or social worker whenever such help is needed. Please contact the building principal if you have any questions or concerns regarding this matter.

Bloodborne Pathogens

Guidelines have been established so that the District can comply with Federal regulations for protecting individuals against exposure to blood pathogens and other infectious materials which can cause Hepatitis B and/or HIV viruses. A plan has been designed to identify likely situations where staff members could be exposed, to describe how such situations can be minimized, and the ways in which exposure will be managed. Part of the federally mandated procedures include a requirement that the District request permission from the parents of the student who was bleeding to consent to be tested for HBV and HIV. This information would then be provided both to the exposed employee and the treating physician to determine proper medical treatment.

Free/Reduced Priced Meals

Edwardsburg Public Schools participates in the Federal School Meals program. Certain persons are eligible for free or reduced priced meals. The schools notify all families of the availability, eligibility requirements and application procedures for free and reduced meals by distributing an application to the family of each student enrolled in the school district. Additional applications may be obtained in any of the building offices.

Asbestos Information

In compliance with the 1989 U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), we have performed inspections of each of our school buildings for asbestos containing materials. The inspection findings and asbestos management plans are on file in each school administrative office and in the office at Central Maintenance. The EPA requires us to perform re-inspections of the asbestos materials every three years. The three-year re-inspections were performed by an accredited asbestos inspector in July 2023. We performed the six-month periodic surveillance as required by AHERA regulations in July 2023. Asbestos materials in the District are in good condition and we will continue to manage them in place or remove as recommend and approved.

Directory Information

Each year the Superintendent shall provide public notice to students and their parents of its intent to make available, upon request, certain information known as "directory information": a student's name; address; telephone number; date and place of birth; major field of study; participation in officially recognized activities and sports; height and weight, if a member of an athletic team; dates of attendance; date of graduation; awards received; honor rolls; scholarships. Parents and eligible students may refuse to allow the District to disclose any or all such "directory information" upon written notification to the District within ten (10) days after receipt of the District's public notice.

Only "directory information" regarding a student shall be released to any person or party, other than the student or his/her parent, without the written consent of the parent; or, if the student is an eligible student, the written consent of the student, except those persons or parties stipulated by the Board's policy and administrative guidelines and/or those specified in the law. The Board shall exempt from disclosure directory information, as requested for the purpose of surveys, marketing, or solicitation, unless the Board determines that the use is consistent with the educational mission of the Board and beneficial to the affected students. The Board may take steps to ensure that directory information disclosed shall not be used, rented, or sold for the purpose of surveys, marketing, or solicitations. Before disclosing the directory information, the Board may require the requester to execute an affidavit stating that directory information provided shall not be used, rented, or sold for the purpose of surveys, marketing, or solicitation.

Notice of Career and Technical Educational Programs

Each year, the Edwardsburg Public School District offers Career and Technical Education programs at Edwardsburg High School. These programs are designed to prepare youth for a broad range of employment and training services and are offered under the guidance of certified teachers, counselors and cooperative education coordinators. The following is a sample of programs being offered this year and criteria for admission.

SAT Reading Score 490

SMC Middle College Prerequisite - 3.25 GPA, ACCUPLACER or SAT Reading Score 490

All career and technical education programs follow the district's policies of non-discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry, gender, age, disability, height, weight or marital status in all programs, activities, and employment.
